Don't See Your Celebration?

If your celebration was not included for the month, please let Fr. Michael know so he can update the parish records. **Blessings...** The frequent use of the material of creation in the Orthodox Church reminds us that matter is good and can become a medium of the Holy Spirit. Most importantly, it affirms the central truth of the Orthodox Christian faith: that God became flesh in Jesus Christ and entered into the midst of creation thereby redirecting the cosmos toward its vocation to glorify its Creator.

Fruit

It is the tradition of the Day of Transfiguration to consecrate grapes, apples and other fruit after the Divine Liturgy. The custom of bringing fruit to the temple for consecration originates in Old Testament times (Gen 4:2-4; Ex 13:12-13; Num 15:19-21; Deut 8:10-14). The Apostles brought this tradition to the Church of the New Testament (1 Cor 16:1-2). Instruction regarding bringing fruit to the church is found in the Third Rule of the Apostolic Canon, the earliest collection of ecclesiastic laws (canons), known since the second century. Since early times, the faithful have been bringing them to the church for consecration and as Thanksgiving to God. St. John Chrysostom wrote, "The plowman receives fruit from the earth not so much for his labor and diligence, as out of goodness of God Who grows this fruit, because neither is he that planteth any thing, neither he that watereth; but God that giveth the increase."

Grapes are brought to temple because they are directly related to the Eucharistic sacrament; that is why in the prayer for consecration of grapes the priest says, "Bless, Lord, this new fruit of the vine which reached ripeness because Thou didst kindly provide good weather, drops of rain, and stillness. Let the partaking of this fruit of the vine make us joyful. And give us the honor of offering this fruit to Thee, as the gift of cleansing of sins, altogether with the Holy Body of Thy Christ."

Flowers & Herbs

Holy Tradition tells us that all the Apostles, with the exception of St. Thomas, were transported mystically to Jerusalem in order to be with the Mother of God – the Theotokos – as she reposed, and to be present at her burial. When the Apostle Thomas arrived the third day after her repose, the Apostles opened the tomb so that he could kiss her farewell. As the tomb was opened, the body of the Most Pure Virgin was missing, and the cave was filled with flowers and the sweet fragrance of Paradise. This was a sure sign of her great purity and holiness to the faithful.



Therefore as part of our celebration of Dormition we bless flowers and fragrant herbs – and the faithful traditionally keep them in their homes. The herbs, used as natural medicine, are blessed in commemoration of the numerous healings and the extraordinary grace bestowed on the pilgrims at the blessed tomb of the Mother of God. During times of family strife or illness, it is a pious custom to place the flower petals in the house censer, together with the incense, and cense the whole house with it.

Coming to Church

Church Services Now Being Celebrated Outside

Before You Arrive

Remember we need to know you are coming. Make sure you have contacted Dn George of your intent to attend EACH service before you arrive.

On the Day of the Service

If you are feeling at all unwell on the day of the service, please stay home and take care of yourself. If you need to, contact your healthcare provider so he or she can give you guidance. Please also call Fr. Michael and let him know so he can include you in the church's prayers.

Arriving at Church

Arrive and wait for the Greeters to greet and assist you. Please be patient. As you wait, find a shady spot. Standing in the sun can alter the reading of your temperature. If your temperature is over 100.4 you will need to go home and get care.

- At all times we all must maintain social distancing standards

- If you can, bring a portable chair and/or shade structure for yourself or someone else.

- Icons may be venerated without kissing or touching

- Candles are available for people to take home or ask Fr Michael or a Greeter to light one in church

Face Coverings

Remember all persons ages 8+ must wear face coverings during the service with the exception of serving clergy and assigned choir singers who are to remove theirs as they serve. Children ages 2 and under are NOT to wear face coverings.

Parents, be prepared to keep your children close to you during the service.

Reflections On & From the Pearl

Our Lord Jesus Christ frequently taught in parables. Some are lengthy narratives while others are brief metaphors – "the kingdom of heaven is like…" He explained the reason for doing so to his disciples using the Prophecy of Isaiah – "Therefore I speak to them in parables, because seeing they do not see, and hearing they do not hear, nor do they understand." (Matthew 13:13) In fact, the entire

13th Chapter of Matthew is devoted to parables including the familiar Pearl of Great Price -"Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant seeking beautiful pearls, who, when he had found one pearl of great price, went and sold all that he had and bought it." (Matthew 13:45-46)

Volumes have been written over the centuries commenting on this passage of scripture. Some exegetes think the pearl is Christ Himself, others His Wisdom, still others the Church. The emphasis is often placed on the merchant who is searching for that most valuable jewel sacrificing everything to acquire it. In this analysis, we are cast in the role of that merchant seeking truth, wisdom and communion with Him who "brought us from non-existence into being". In our case, the selling, the sacrifice, is the release through repentance those passions whether material or spiritual that separate us from God.

Through the history of humankind rarity has always been the primary determinant of the value of any material thing. Even something as simple as salt that we can now possess for a pittance was once the focal point of warfare between nations. In the ancient world, the pearl was counted among the most valuable of gems not only for its beauty but also for its scarcity. It is interesting that among all the geologic debris that we pronounce and value as gemstones, the only one that is the product of a creature, a living organism, is the pearl. Moreover, all the other stones require refinement or manipulation by humans to enhance their beauty. The pearl emerges from the oyster complete and radiant, not requiring the hand of man to release its fire. It is also worth contemplating that the pearl is formed by this



mollusk in defense of an irritant, a foreign intruder, presenting a threat to its life.

Chances are that we have never seen a natural pearl because their scarcity today exceeds even that of biblical times. What we find in our jewelry stores are pearls still constructed by an oyster but with the impetus of a human hand. The luster of a pearl comes from a covering called nacre layered by the oyster over a nucleus placed within its body. In the mass production of these "cultured" pearls, the amount of luminous nacre is scant in comparison to the size of the foreign body inserted. The distinction of what can viewed as genuine and that which is a facsimile has been blurred by clever merchandizing.

In extending the metaphor of the pearl to today's culture, we are confounded by a plethora of distorted aberrations of Christianity that appear to have a luminous exterior but at the core contain little of redemptive value. Chapter 24 of the Gospel of Matthew is devoted to Jesus' prophecy of the end-times in which He predicts this occurrence. "For there shall arise false Christs, (continued on last page)

and false prophets, and shall show great signs and wonders; insomuch that, if it were possible, they shall deceive the very elect."

In the Orthodox Christian Church, we hold that the Kingdom of Heaven, acclaimed as that Pearl of Great Price by the Lord Himself is fully present when we gather for Liturgical worship. The Divine Liturgy begins with the proclamation, "Blessed is the Kingdom". It is here, it is now, and it shines forth more luminous than any gemstone. We ascribe beauty to a precious gem based on how it reflects light. The diamond requires faceting to release its fire and the number of facets for the ideal cut is fixed. The deep luminescence of the pearl comes without manipulation, without faceting. In some sense, one could say that the facets of the Pearl of Great Price are infinite in number all

reflecting the Divine Light. In the 4th Century, Saint Ephraim the Syrian composed this hymn:

On a certain day a pearl did I take up, my brethren; I saw in it mysteries pertaining to the Kingdom; Semblances and types of the Majesty; It became a fountain, and I drank out of it mysteries of the Son. I put it, my brethren, upon the palm of my hand, That I might examine it: I went to look at it on one side, And it proved faces on all sides. I found out that the Son was incomprehensible, Since He is wholly Light.
